

Cadets compete for top honors

VANCEBORO — Puddled drill pads from the previous night's rain didn't stop cadets from giving their all at West Craven High School's fourth annual Coastal Classic Drill Meet Oct. 22.

Sixteen Air Force JROTC units competed in the competition. including Surrattsville High School from Clinton, Md. While other schools didn't have to drive as far, cadets came from Cumberland, Montgomery, Nash and Wayne counties.

Teams competed in regulation drill maneuvers and exhibition events. Regulation events were pre-designed by West Craven students. Drill cards containing the routine were sent to the schools prior to the competition. Exhibition events, however, are created by the individual teams and are judged on creativity.

Senior Master Sgt. Jake Jacobs from Pinecrest High School in Southern Pines has been impressed with his freshman cadets this year. Of the 24 cadets on the drill team, Jacobs said about half of them are freshmen.

"Our freshmen this year are better than last year," he said. "I use my freshmen as an example to my AS IIs and AS IIIs [sophomores and

juniors].' Jacobs was optimistic about this meet. "We've been here every year," he said. "We've walked away with at least 10 trophies." He added that Pinecrest had not yet won overall, but intended to change that, if not this year, next year.

With fellow instructor Col. Cecil Eason away, Chief Master Sgt. Alden Hargett held down the fort with the help of cadets from the Eagle Squadron and parent supporters.
