Georgia tackles Tennessee

The nationally ranked Tennessee Volunteers found themselves facing their third opponent in 13 days; the No. 5 Georgia Bulldogs, a team known for its solid defense.

In a 27-14 victory Oct 8, the undefeated Georgia Bulldogs moved to 5-0 on the season as they handed Tennessee its second loss this season, dropping the Vols to 3-2.

Georgia showed Tennessee no mercy as the Bulldogs kept it a close game, until finally scoring two touchdowns in the fourth quarter, bringing the score up to 27-7 in Georgia's favor.

Tennessee quarterback Rick Clausen and Co. didn't give up easily, though, driving 64 yards down the field and scoring on a 24-yard Robert Meachem touchdown reception to end

In the first quarter, Georgia drove 84 yards down the field, and got on the board early with a 1-yard TD run by Brannan Southerland, making the score 7-0.

With 50 seconds left in the first half, Tennessee's defensive keystone Jason Allen was carted off the field with a left hip injury. and the loss was felt on the field as walked all over the vaunted Tennessee defense in the second half of the game.

But just before halftime. Georgia, with no timeouts left, scrambled to get its field goal unit on the field and kick a last-second field goal with two seconds on the clock, bringing

the score to 10-0. For the first time this season, Tennessee

allowed an opposing team to rush for more than 100 yards in a game.

Georgia running back Thomas Brown rushed 20 times for 95 yards, his lone TD came on an 18-yard run in the fourth quarter, helping to make the score 27-7. Undefeated Georgia quarterback D.J.

Shockley had, statistically, a poor outing, completing 16-27 passes for 207 yards and an interception, but it was good enough to pull out the win.

On the other side of the ball, Clausen, statistically, had a somewhat better game than his counterpart, completing 21-of-36 for 311 yards, while tossing a TD and an in-

terception. He appeared out of rhythm with his receivers all game long, often overthrowing a wide-open receiver.

Although a banged-up Clausen started the game, over a relatively healthy Eric Ainge, he believed that he could lead his team to victory while overcoming a horde of injuries. Prior to the game, his injuries were listed as tendonitis in his left Achilles tendon, bruised left shoulder and elbow and two dislocated fingers on his non-throwing

hand. Gerald Riggs led the Volunteers in rush ing yards, gaining 54 yards on 19 carries.

Georgia's 6-foot 7-inch wide receiver Justin Pope led the team in receiving yards, with four receptions for 70 yards.

Georgia travels to take on Vanderbilt next Saturday, while Tennessee has this week off before heading to Alabama to take on the Crimson Tide on Oct. 22.
